

### HART DISTRICT LOCAL PLANT INQUIRY

The Inquiry opens at 9.30 am on Tuesday 15 March in the Civic Hall, Fleet. This Inquiry into the District Plan is not to be confused with the three inquires held last year. Those were investigations by the DoE resulting from planning appeals made by developers. No decision has come from the DoE for any of these three triple-stie inquiries, although in the normal course of events decisions are generally made public within 6 months of the Appeal hearing.

The District Plan Inquiry is held by Hart, in the presence of an Inspector allocated by the DoE but paid for by Hart, to hear objections to the published Local Plan. This Inquiry is entirely divorced from any previous comments made about the Draft local plan. This distinction, as the chairman of Yateley Residents pointed out in the local paper, was not sufficiently understood by local bodies. Since the hundreds of letters of objection written last year for the Hill Farm and Monteagle Farm sites are "forgotten" in this last phase of the planning process, only The Society and 3 local residents now have the right to make representations for Yateley at this Inquiry.

This time written statements of objection have to be submitted to the Inspector before the Inquiry opens, and are taken as read by all present. The developers will be represented by their various QC's for at least the first week, but thereafter the affair will become much more cheek-by-jowl, around the table in the committee room of the Council Offices. Here specific points of evidence will be scrutinised by the Inspector. The DoE's silence on the outcome

of the developers' appeals last year is related to the complexity of these select exchanges. Despite the apparently smaller arena, The Society will be fighting the last-ditch stand to halt the stread of housing over all the remaining green field sites in Yateley - and on over the fields to Eversley.

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For in addition to Hill Farm and Monteagle Farm, the other 2 sites identified by The Society in its land use map last year are being touted for development, one at Moulsham Lane (the "Urn Field"), the other at the present site of the mushroom farm at Darby Creen. As was predicted, the scramble for the last few acres is on. And because the people of Yateley did not send further protest letters by 20 December 1982, they will not be able to give evidence at the Inquiry. The only remaining line of action open is to write immediately to The Society. Those letters can then be used to back-up The Society's case.

Members are urged to convince neighbours to write one last letter. Letters must clearly state support for the Society's case for no further housing in Yateley. Site objections can only be made to the Monteagle Farm site (the Yateley site in the District Plan), and comments should concentrate briefly on the lack of facilities, the lack of land, and the growing stresses for the existing population. Letters should be sent to the Mon Secretary, John Barker, 21 Wyndham Close, Yateley by Wednesday 10 March.

Anyone in doubt still about the issues should go to the Yateley Library where Part I of The Society's Planning exhibition will be again for the month of March.

Has it been forgotten that The Vateley Society is a civic amenity society? Over the past year it may have seemed to some that we have been preoccupied with planning issues. This apparent bias is one of the short-term consequences of being an amenity group. What is built today makes the heritage of tomorrow, so in thinking for the future we have to attend to details in the here-and-now.

One of The Society's aims as a civic society is to promote good standards of planning and architecture. It is therefore of considerable moment to Yateley that in 1982 Newlands Primary School, Dungells Lane was awarded one of the Civic Trust Awards.

Only 21 Awards were made out of a total of 1055 entries. In Hampshire 25 approjects were submitted, so that in both local and national terms Newlands School is acknowledged as a remarkable contribution to the "built environment."

The citation in the Awards booklet reads:

"Approached through delicate and leafy birch woodland the school on first sight immediately appeals. Its low form which seems to be cut into the surrounding contours is protected by a shallow pitched roof with broad overhancing eaves. Flank walls in white brickwork extend outwards to engage the landscape, forming enclosures which appear to be extensions of the transparent walls. The two main teaching blocks pivot about an elegant conservatory which acts as a further transitional link between the external and internal psaces. Detailling is very professional and consistent throughout, achieving a remarkably high standard of finish with basic materials - stained softwood, glass, white brick and brown concrete roof tiles which together produce a very subtle colour scheme."

Ranked alongside such structures as the River Hull Tidal Surge Barrier, the Flotta Oil Handling Terminal, Orkney and a roadwidening scheme in St Brelade, Jersey, Newlands School is an example of architectural standards which now rate harmony with the environment as being of equal importance to excellence in design. Hampshire County Council are to be congratulated on the Award, especially since the designer is C. Stansfield Smith, the County Architect. chance to take over this spring. Another idea was that of planting shrubs and heather in certain areas. These will be supplied by the Town Council and planted by the Gardening Club. It was also thought we as a society would like to donate a tree and this offer was gratefully received. Now all we have to do is decide on the species and where to put it.

This is an on-going project as we shall be looked at by the judges at various times during the year, so if members can keep an eye out for any situation that looks like needing attention then please let me, Pat Tattersall, know (Yat 878027) so that something can be done about it.

### COUNTRYSIDE CONSERVATION ... by Mary Robins

par bon Look then at that the Charlings exer exacting Peter Dinsdale, the Ranger for the Yateley Common Country Park, was invited for an informal talk with the Ecology group on 27 January. We were interested to know something of what his job entails, and to offer practical help. He told us of the less pleasant aspects of his duties, like cleaning up after the continual visits by gypsies, and of the struccle to stop encroachments by the scrapyard in Vigo Lane. We learnt that there are annually about one million visitors to the park and that monetary resources are spread very thinly. A visitor centre would be a welcome asset as an educational place for school parties and somewhere to display information about local wildlife. We discussed the problems of horses and motor cycles, both of which do some damage but are difficult to control. Would a permit system be a good idea for the horse riders?

As regards the help that the group could give, in Dinsdale said that he is "fighting to stand still" with the vegetation. The birch trees very rapidly overshadow the heather and bog areas; lowland acid heath is nationally a vanishing habitat, so should be protected. The group's help would be much appreciated in thinning out birch trees and pulling out Scots pine seedlings where these are undesirable. In fact a party of about a dozen of us spent an enjoyable afternoon doing just that on Sunday 13 February. The Town Council plans to clear out the pond behind the Old Mospital on Cricket Hill; this is filling in naturally and will cease to exist if nothing is done to it.

Valerie Kerslake (Yat 872240) coordinates the working parties and all helping hands are most welcome. The next working party is on Sunday 13 March, meeting at the cemetery at 2.00 pm to weed out and cut down seedling trees and gorse from a stretch of heather further up the path. It's hard work but the results are most gratifying. Do come and help - bow saws and thick gloves useful!



At Pateley the garlands were very elaborate, and had a doll seated in the centre of crossed hoops, representing the Virgin Marp.

Many customs of the past have died out but at the May Fair, on Yateley Green this year, The Yateley Society hope to reinstate a traditional May Day custom. From the publication "It Happened in Hampshire" by The Hampshire Federation of Women's Institutes we learn that, "nearly every village had its May Day which many called Garland Day." Children made garlands from flowers and greenery and were awarded pennies for their efforts.

We would like to ask the children of Yateley to design and make their own garlands and bring them to our tent during the morning of the fair. They will be on display all day and will be judged at 4 o'clock. Small prizes will be awarded for the best designs. Garlands should have a label attached indicating your name, age and address.
