Borderware Potteries
by
Jacqui Pearce of the Museum of London



Why are the Borderware Potteries so important?

For over 600 years potters working on the Hampshire/Surrey borders in the Blackwater Valley have been major suppliers to the London market.

In Tudor and Stuart times they were the dominant suppliers of all types of pottery, both white and redwares. Even from the start of the 18th century when the Blackwater Valley's whiteware was replaced by Staffordshire production using china clay, and London's own potteries were producing both 'deftware' and white salt-glazed ware, our local Borderware potteries continued to supply most of London's redwares.

Knowledge of this major local industry had been largely lost to the collective memory until a tree was blown down in the grounds of Farnborough Hill school in 1967, revealing shards of pottery.

Subsequent excavations over several years discovered a major production site dating from the middle to late 1500s. The considerable quantities of pottery from these excavations have never been fully catalogued and analysed, but this has now been rectified, and will be the subject of a new book to be published by the Museum of London in the summer of 2007.

This is Jacqui Pearce's second book on Borderware and will concentrate on the archaeology from the last quarter of the 16th century, and documentary research into the potters likely to have been working in this 25-year period.

Just as the archaeological evidence has long awaited full investigation, so there had been no comprehensive documentary research into the lives of these potters, and the commercial systems used to enable their products to reach their markets. Last autumn, at Jacqui's request, the Society carried out extensive research into the lives of the potters living in Farnborough and Cove from 1560-1660.

much of this research was already contained in the Society's Yateley History Project Database. Jacqui will talk about the Surrey-Hampshire Borderware industry from the late medieval period to the 17th century, paying special attention to the excavations at Farnborough Hill, but also looking at other production centres, pottery form and function, technology and the wider connections with London, the Continent and the American colonies. We are very the world expert privileged to have Borderware to speak us.



Family History Corner – Henry Broad – Conclusion (from the family history narrative compiled by Godfrey H. Broad November 2006 about Henry Broad, schoolmaster of Yateley School 30 December 1867 to about 15 November 1872.)

Henry Broad died at Yateley on 15 December 1873 Haemoptysis 6 months Phthisis 1 year (Tuberculosis), aged 26. A promising career was cut short, putting Mrs Broad and her son, Arthur Henry Broad, in limbo. What happened to Mary Ann Broad? Where did she go? Did she go back to her family? Did she get TB, too? Did she keep the child? What was her means of support?

The census evidence indicates that she went back to her family who in 1871 and 1881 lived at Hartley Wespall, where Mary Ann was born and her father Stephen Charlton was a gardener.

In 1879 Mary Anne Broad married Thomas Turton a Gardner who was born in Halewood, Lancashire. They produced a son, also Thomas Turton, born in Earley, near Reading in Berkshire. The census records Arthur Brown as Stepson age 8, born Yateley, Hants. This is almost certainly the enumerator's error in the census and should read Arthur Broad!

By 1891 Mary and Thomas had produced two more children, Leonard and Winifred. It would appear that the Turtons moved to Dorset where Thomas was employed as a Gardner (Domestic), and in October 1890, the military records tell us that at the age of 18, Arthur Henry Broad joined the Grenadier Guards.

All members, their families and prospective members are welcome.




